





Last month, residents along Marine Street were battling a grave problem. Rats had been entering their homes, eating from garbage dumps, and creating a mess This was a threat to the residents' health. Who knew where the rats might have been and what kinds of germs they were carrying?

Mr Soh, the chairman of the Marine Residents' Committee, decided to invite the residents to a discussion on this matter. However, some residents thought that it was the Town Council's responsibility to sort it out. They felt that the meeting was a sheer waste of their time. When Mr Soh started the meeting, he spoke in a solemn tone, "As you all know, the newspapers have been reporting about the sightings of the rodents in our neighbourhood. There has been a sudden increase in the number of rats in the vicinity, not to mention the terrible destruction that they have caused."

The residents readily provided many reasons for the cause of this problem. Several days later, Mr Soh informed the residents through a notice that an inspection had been conducted by the officers. Though the pest control officers had succeeded in clearing the area of rats, residents were strongly advised to dispose of their rubbish property.

When the residents met Mr Soh again, they thanked Mr Soh for his efforts in ensuring a clean and safe neighbourhood for all. The chairman beamed and said "You have played your part too. Let us continue to strive to create a more pleasant neighbourhood for everyone."
