





Outdoor Adventures: Good Safety Tips







Do you have plans for the school holidays? How about going for a hike in a forest? What about a camping trip with your family or friends?


Such activities allow you to have fun and get close to nature, but safety needs to be your *number one priority*. Whatever you do, make sure you pick up essential survival skills and pack wisely before setting off.

Unexpected things can sometimes happen in the great outdoors. Since you can never anticipate exactly what might go wrong, carrying a survival kit in your pocket is always worthwhile. Let's look at how we can find ways to utilise every tiny bit of space inside a small, lightweight and waterproof container. Include as many useful everyday items as possible!

## How to assemble a personal survival kit:

- 1. Get a small plastic or metal container that fits in your pocket.
- 2. Remove the rough strip from the side of a matchbox.
- 3. Wrap the strip and a few matches in plastic wrap to keep them dry.
- 4. Break a pencil in half and keep one piece within the container.
- 5. Sharpen both ends of the pencil piece.
- 6. Cut plastic straws into segments that fit inside your container. Seal one end of each segment with tape. Fill each mini tube with small amounts of liquids like hand sanitizer and antiseptic cream. Then seal the other end.
- 7. Collect plasters of various sizes.
- 8. Fold several large sheets of aluminium foil as compactly as possible.
- Begin by placing the essential items inside the container. Estimate the remaining space and consider other useful items that can fit in your personal survival kit.
   Maximise the use of space to include as many additional items as possible.

I met Lina at my summer job when we were working for a trading company in Taipei. As a teenager, I frequently quarrelled with my parents, so I was in low spirits all the time. At the age when one tended to exaggerate one's unhappiness, I constantly showed up at work with an expression that suggested the universe would soon come to an end. Lina, on the other hand, always wore a smile on her face, which, with her two dimples, made her look like a carefree angel.

She always listened to my complaints. I harped on how unfair my parents were and what a wonderful life I would have led had I not been born into such a terrible family. Whenever she tried to offer advice, I would say, "You won't understand."

One Wednesday, after yet another squabble with my parents, I decided to teach them 10 a lesson for shouting at me. I decided to 'run away'. I asked Lina if I could stay with her for a while. She smiled, "Sure, but we have a small place which we share, if you don't mind that." I assured her that I would not.

After work that evening, I got on the bus with Lina. We rode the bus to the Taipei train station, then walked approximately fifteen minutes to catch another bus. Finally, we hiked along 15 mountain trails for fifteen minutes. When we got to Lina's home, it was after 8pm. Nevertheless, I looked forward to basking in the warmth of Lina's family, something that I never got at home.

Lina and her grandmother lived in a converted dormitory for miners together with eight families under the same roof. They even shared a common kitchen and bathroom. In the dormitory, Lina and her grandmother resided in a tiny room, smaller than the bathroom at my 20 home. Orphaned from birth, Lina was raised by her grandmother who used to wash clothes for the miners living **there**. When the workers moved away, she was out of work. Since then, Lina attended school in the evening and worked during the day.

Lina showed no signs of unhappiness while telling me about her life. Her home was small but clean. The old wooden door was scrubbed so white that it shone. Her plan was to 25 work as an accountant after she graduated from school. With a steady income, they would move out of the hills and share an apartment with another family. They would have a flush toilet, sparing her grandmother the pain of using a squat toilet.

Lina's grandmother listened to my complaints and was concerned about me. "They may not be perfect, but they are still your kin," she said. "Don't be mad at them for too long, or 30 you'll end up not having a family at all." I was left deep in thought.

That night, I was given their small bed. Lina and her grandmother willingly slept on the hard ground. I tossed and turned all night. My 'sorrow' and 'worries' suddenly seemed so insignificant. When I got up at dawn, Lina was preparing porridge in the common kitchen. Seeing me, she turned to the rising sun and said, "Beautiful, isn't it? I like to watch the sunrise 35 from here. I feel life is full of hope when I see the sunlight slowly get brighter and brighter."

After work that day, I meekly went home. My four-room flat felt so much more comfortable compared to Lina's humble abode. The next day, my father prepared a plate of scrambled eggs and pancakes for my breakfast. I started speaking more politely to my parents, and subsequently, we stopped squabbling. Soon, my 'depression' evaporated.

When the summer job ended, both Lina and I went back to school, and we soon lost touch. Now twenty years later, I have two children of my own, but the image of Lina remains with me - the girl with angelic dimples who had so little, yet taught me so much.


