In 1926, Loi Ah Koon, came to Singapore from China and worked as an assistant at a coffee stall. After working for 10 years, Loi partnered with two other Chinese immigrants to set up their own business. They ran a coffee stall that served coffee, tea, charcoal-grilled toast and eggs at Telok Ayer Basin. His cliente included coolies, merchants, moneylenders, police inspectors and boat operators.

Loi roasted his own coffee beans using margarine and sugar over firewood, and prepared the toasted bread meticulously. He also often slept on the countertop of the stall in order to wake up on time to serve the first customers at 5 in the morning. Over the years, Loi's coffee stall grew into a familiar name due to its good coffee and kaya toast. The stall was renamed Ya Kun in 1972. Today, Ya Kun has approximately 70 stores in Singapore and 120 stores in 10 countries around the world.
