

The extract below is taken from an article about 'Batik'.

Batik is a dyeing technique that originated from Indonesia. It utilises wax and fabric dye to create breathtaking patterns and designs on various kinds of cloth. Liquid wax is applied to a pattern on a piece of cloth before it is dyed. As the pattern resists colouring, it remains on the cloth when the wax is melted away. This is the art of batik.

In the past, batik was commonly used for making clothes. Most women in Indonesia made a living using their batik skills. Today, fashion designers worldwide use batik in their work. Interior designers also feature batik patterns in home decorations from blankets to cushion covers to wallpaper.
