After months of designing, planning and working with various partners, Green Park was finally opened to the public on 1 August 2022. Located in the south-western part of Singapore, Green Park comprises over 20 hectares of land, offering facilities and activities for both the young and old.

For the month of August, Green Park has collaborated with local artists and arts groups to offer a fun-filled month-long event that allows visitors to discover how nature blends with the arts. Visitors will be treated to an open-air concert, poetry appreciation and a photography exhibition and contest.

There is also an Edible Plants Garden for those with green fingers to dabble in. Trained guides will conduct hourly walks within the nature reserve, highlighting plants and small animals often hidden in plain sight. Visitors can look forward to the sights and sounds of the serene park.

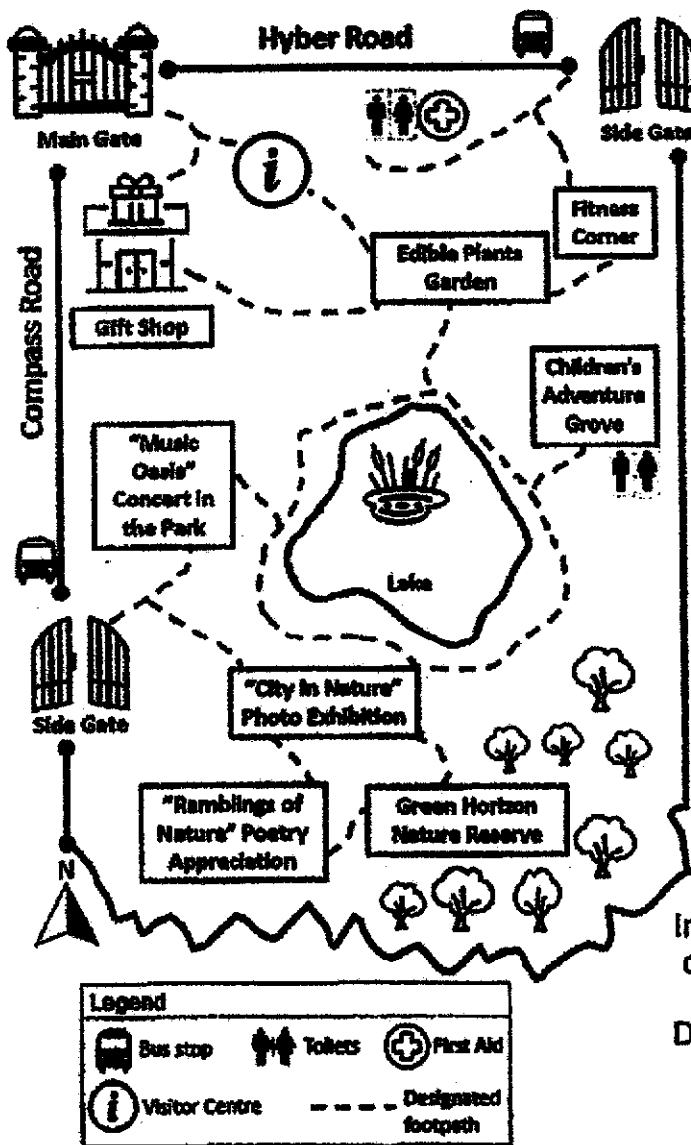

He was not good enough. Not serious enough. Not hardworking enough. Not. Not. Not. Competing in races, compiling achievements, comparing results. Such suffocating expectations.

And yet here he was, in a line with other windsurfers, all of them bobbing nervously on the waves behind an imaginary starting line. They were all fighting for the best position to start and tense as a result. It seemed so silly to Hwa, given the whole expanse of the sea. Hwa moved away. How LI-An had talked him into doing this, he did not know. As usual, she had managed to get her way by coaxing, scolding, mocking, daring him. Just as she had always done since they were little. Hwa had never been excited by races. He had not even bothered to wear the digital watch that everyone else seemed to be wearing to time the very second they start. Yet, Hwa's reaction was so natural and quick that at the very moment the starter's horn sounded, he was off. Hwa pulled hard at his sail to race just ahead of the group. As he picked up speed, gliding over the waves, he began to feel the familiar joy and freedom that windsurfing always gave him, despite his earlier doubts. What he loved was simply being out at sea. He could barely stop himself from yelling out in exhilaration.

"Go Hwa!" The wind carried over a familiar voice. He looked around and spotted LI-An upwind of him – in a stationary speedboat – with someone at the helm. She waved at Hwa and he nodded his head in acknowledgement, even though he knew she was too far away to see him. Just as he turned away, however, out of the corner of his eye, he saw a swirl of smoke behind the speedboat, on the shore. Knowing that the smoke could tell him the direction the wind was blowing, he decided to study it for a moment out of habit. Just as he was getting a better sense of how to use the wind to his advantage, he saw it.

Not just the smoke but a bright flare – like an explosion or a burst of flames. He sailed closer, going way off course and saw long tongues of flames licking at the sky from behind a construction site. The fire was definitely spreading. What if nobody was aware of this? What if nobody was working there now? It was after all a quiet Sunday afternoon. For a second he hesitated, then decisively swung his sail over and stepped deftly onto the other side of the board until the sail caught the wind from the other side. Hwa directed his surfboard at LI-An's speedboat, avoiding a few of the slower surfers who were lagging behind. "Fire!" Hwa shouted when he got within earshot of LI-An. She stared at him, clearly confused. "Wrong way!" she shouted back. "Fire! Fire!" Hwa yelled again, waving one hand towards land in the direction of the smoke. "Call 995!" She looked at where he was pointing, saw the smoke and understood his intent. Hwa waited long enough to see LI-An talking into her mobile phone urgently before turning his attention to the race.

The others were far ahead of him now. A gust of fresh wind had sprung up – too good to be wasted – and Hwa swung about to meet it full on. Hwa laughed out loud in exhilaration at the rhythm of the wind and wave powering him forward. This was not about him and the other competitors; this was him playing with the wave and the wind, with the sea and the sail.

As always, back on land after a race, Hwa felt down. News reporters and photographers started to surround him. Good job, third place, he was being told – good enough for the bronze medal. Those words sounded strange, almost like a taunt. So finally he was seen as "good enough"? Whatever happened to the "nots"?

"And in third place," the announcement blared from the speaker system, "even with having made the detour to raise the warning about the fire! A tremendous achievement by..." Hwa heard his name being announced, and then the sound of applause and cheering.
